The Arctic has become a "hot" topic, with scientists, business leaders, military, and even tourists voicing serious and sometimes conflicting concerns. Norway and the US are two large stakeholders in the region. Our speaker, Linda Priebe, will explain the web of Arctic issues and outline the opportunities and challenges facing the US and Norway.

Ms. Priebe is a practicing attorney at Culhane Meadows where she is Chair of Government Relations. Her practice includes advocacy for Arctic interests before U.S. and international agencies. Prior to joining Culhane Meadows she served for over fourteen years in White House offices as a trusted legal advisor to three U.S. presidential administrations.

## Genealogy Interest Group Update: Mining Digital Archives

### **July Meeting**

Ten members of the Genealogy Interest Group (GIG) met at Norway House on July 10. Based on a set of names provided by Jeff Jorgenson, Joel Myklebust was able to search the Digital Archives of Norway and confirm the names, dates of birth,

parish, other relevant information of these greatgrandparents who emigrated from Norway to Minnesota in the late 1800s. This session was inespecially formative GIG members were able to follow the internet searches on the big screen. Given

that these four individuals were born in different locations in Norway during the period 1829–1857, several databases had to be consulted to complete the information. At future meetings, other GIG members will propose names and avail themselves of the genealogical expertise and resources of

others.

Seven members of the group met at Norway House on August 14. Marvin Reed, longtime Sons



of Norway Washington Lodge member and an experienced genealogist, commented on the process that he uses to conduct a general genealogi-

cal search. Marvin also presented the results of his search on Hans C. Mork, great-grandfather of GIG member Jeff Jorgenson.

When initiating a search, Marvin strongly recommended that you develop a plan and decide whether you want to conduct a topical overview about a person or undertake a com-

prehensive verification of information.

You should also think about the extent of your search: are you interested identifying any and all possible relatives in a "horizontal" search (for example, first, second, and third cousins) or are you more interested in doing a "vertical" search

and tracing back your lineage to the earliest possible ancestor?

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Next, locate existing family genealogy data. Other relatives, for example, may already have compiled and published a family genealogy that includes the name of the person that you are researching. Search engines such a Google or

Mozilla, for example, using a search string such as "Hans C. Mork Norway Born 1861" will identify numerous links to sites with family trees and related historical records.

Some of these sites are free, while others

charge a membership fee. In the case of Hans C. Mork, we were able to locate, for example, U.S. census records, an application for a social security card, and a photo-

graph of his gravestone in Minnesota. Using the Norway Digital Archives, we were also able to locate scanned originals as well as digitized parish records (births, baptisms, weddings) going back another 2-3 generations to the 1700s. Based on this information, we

have a much better idea about the life and









times of Hans C. Mork. Using these skills and tools, GIG members will undertake additional searches as time and energy permit.

The next GIG meeting will be Sunday, Sept 18, 2-4 PM at Norway House. All are wel-

### **Book review:**

## Berlin Poplars by Anne Ragde

What an extraordinary trio of brothers one finds in this captivating novel by celebrated Norwegian writer Anne Ragde! Three more dissimilar siblings could scarcely be imagined. Each of the first three chapters introduces one of these brothers. These detailed descriptions set the stage for a family that has never been a real family.

Margido, the middle brother, is a devout Christian, somber and humorless. He is the director of a funeral home in Trondheim and we follow him in the opening chapter as he prepares a service for an adolescent boy who has committed suicide. We observe his formal but sensitive interaction with the family of the deceased. Beyond his work environment, however, he has little contact with others.

Erlend, the youngest brother, has a joie de vivre that contrasts sharply with Margido's stiffness. He did not find Norway much to his liking, so he left for Copenhagen when a young adult and flourished there. A very talented and successful window dresser, he is especially busy at Christmas time as he is in great demand to decorate department store windows in grand style for the holidays. He is gay and has a partner whom he adores and affectionately calls Crumb. He rarely thinks about


his family back in Norway.

The oldest brother Tor has never left Neshov, the family farm, and lives there with his parents. He is very attached to his mother but can barely tolerate his father. He has always worked hard to eke out a living and seems to prefer the company of animals to that of humans. He is currently breeding pigs after many years of raising cows.

Torunn is then introduced. She is the daughter of Tor but not everyone knows of her existence. She was born out of wedlock and taken away by her mother who soon abandoned her to her own mother.

Suddenly Anna Neshov, the mother of the three brothers, has a stroke and is hospitalized. Tor is distraught and notifies his two brothers and decides, for some reason, to contact Torunn after many years of silence.

Torunn is not really sure why she agrees to go, but she plans to stay for a short visit and then return to her usual life in Oslo. Erlend is of the same opinion—the quicker he can return to Copenhagen, the better. Although everyone is certain that Anna's condition is not serious, she unexpectedly dies. The two brothers and Torunn agree to stay on and work together with Tor to



settle pressing family affairs.

No one is pleased about hanging around the farm. The atmosphere is fraught with tension and exasperation. Like the Berlin poplars planted in this area by the Germans during their occupation of Norway in World War II (which give the novel its title), Margido, Erlend, and Torunn find themselves in alien soil but with surprisingly deep roots there, nevertheless.

Anna's death gives the members of this dysfunctional family the opportunity to get to know each other better and, in the process, to discover some very shocking family secrets that have long been hidden.

Ragde has written a brilliant novel with a multi-layered plot and a fascinating cast of characters. Berlin Poplars was awarded the prestigious Riksmål Prize in 2004 and has been translated into 21 languages.

# Linda Hurt Teaches Nordic Band Weaving at August Workshop

A hearty group of aspiring Nordic weavers plus our instructor, Linda Hurt, along with her assistant, Renee Greist, assembled at Norway House on August 13. The group started with a light breakfast (we Norwegians must have sustenance and coffee...) before learning the fundamentals of Nordic weaving.

Linda and her assistant were amazing instructors – Linda said her students far exceeded her minimum expectations. All ten students were on different looms (not great for instructors), however everyone was able to set up looms and good even warps.

Linda told us "My minimum expectation was that every-

one would get a plain woven band of about 8" long with irregular selvages (edges). EVERYONE exceeded that. Most did some of the fancy pickup patterns, and at least two got to the complex one. Those who were happy with the plain weaving, without a pickup pattern, had a very even beat and nice crisp selvages, which gave them a professional look."

Everyone had a great time and a few students plan to sign up for additional classes Linda teaches at the Alexandria Art League.







Birding the Future: Norwegian Sonic Artist's **Birdsong in DC**

Norwegian artist Frank Ekeberg is a participant in "Turf and Terrain," the 2016 Arts in Foggy Bottom Outdoor Sculpture Biennial in Washington, DC. He and Krista Caballero collaborated on the multimedia installation Birding the Future, an interdisciplinary work that aims to increase awareness of the extinction of birds.

Ekeberg worked on the sound and Caballero the images, and

they collaborated equally on all other aspects of the work including the original concept and the scientific research upon which it is based.

Ekeberg provides the answer:

"The sound actually comes from a number of loudspeakers that are hidden in the installation area. The sound consists of calls of globally extinct birds as well as of endangered birds in the region where the work is presented. The level and distribution of the speakers are balanced to integrate as much as possible with the local surroundings so that the audience has to listen carefully to distinguish the sounds of the installation from those that occur naturally in the area. In the process they hopefully gain increased

Curator Danielle O'Steen heard about Birding the **Future** when Ekeberg and Caballero, with whom she had worked in the past, were showing it in Dubai after a previous showing in Australia. O'Steen was very excited and says that she "loved the idea of bringing it to Washington to continue its

international reach." She explains why she wanted it in her exhibit:

"This version of Birding the Future marks the first edition for the U.S. and the Mid-Atlantic. It fits very well into the premise of Turf and Terrain, which aims to expand the landscape of Foggy Bottom by tapping into forgotten histories and overlooked aspects of the neighborhood, including its wildlife. Since the work is both physical object and sound, it complicates our assumptions of what outdoor sculpture should be. This is another ambition of the exhibition, as several works use interactive art and new media in public space."

What does Ekeberg want visitors to take away

from *Birding the Fu-ture*? He expresses his hope that

"they will have learned something new about birds in region about issues they are facing, and see the importance in protecting the birds and the ecosystems they are part of, not only because of the birds themselves, but also because we humans depend on and bene-

fit enormously from the work of birds and other species. Protecting the health of all species is crucial for our survival as well."

One in eight of the world's bird species are considered globally threatened, and 2% of all bird species are in imminent danger of extinction - of disappearing forever. The state of the world's birds continues to worsen, including rapidly declining population numbers of common birds, those that are currently not categorized as endangered. Most of the threats to birds are related to human activities. In North America about a third of the birds are threatened with extinction, and a similar percentage is true for Norway. It is a very serious situation worldwide.



## Norwegian Birthday Cake (Bløtkake)

### Cake:

6 eggs

1 c. sugar

1¼ c. flour

1½ t. baking powder

### Filling:

- 1 pint whipping cream
- 1 box vanilla pudding
- 1 c. milk
- 1 quart fresh strawberries
- 1 16 oz. can of peaches
- 1 pint blueberries
- 1. Preheat the oven to 325 and grease a 10" springform pan.
- 2. Beat the eggs and the sugar until light and frothy.
- Sift the flour and baking powder over the egg mixture and blend together quickly with a spoon. Don't overmix!
- 4. Pour the mixture into the springform pan and bake for about 35 minutes, until the center is firm. Cool completely before removing the sides of the pan.
- While it is cooling make the pudding with only 1 cup of milk, instead of the two called for on the box. It will be very thick! Let the pudding cool.



- 6. Once the cake is cool cut it into 3 more or less equal layers. A wire cake lever is very useful for this. Put each of the layers on separate plates. Drizzle with the juice from the peach can. Use up all the juice!
- 7. Mix about ⅔ of the peaches in the can with the cooled pudding, and crush with a fork. Use the mixture to top one of the layers.
- 8. Whip the cream. Crush ¾ of the strawberries and mix with ¼ of the whipped cream. Use this mixture to top another cake layer.
- Stack the cake layers together with the peach layer on the bottom. Frost the cake with the remainder of the whipped cream, and decorate with the remaining strawberries and blueberries.
- 10. Store in the refrigerator.



" it is like driving a car. You do not look in the small rear view mirror to see where you have been, instead you look through the large windshield to see where you are going"

International Vice-President Ron Stubbings used the above quote in his remarks at our 3D Convention and I love them. I will focus on those words for the next two years. Our challenge is that some things in the rear view mirror - memories of our Norwegian heritage – must not be forgotten and must be preserved but we must move forward and respond to bends and turns in the road ahead. How do we connect more people to that heritage? How do we strengthen the ties that already bind?

We will continue to focus on membership, leadership, community and communication. There are a few committees forming to address specific aspects of each of these very important issues; if you are asked to serve on a committee, I hope you will accept. Join the conversation — Deb McConaghy of Norsk Carolina is heading this committee. There are many other aspects of communication and more committees will be forming.

Membership – our Vice-President Kathy Dollymore is in the process of forming three committees each of which will concentrate on a specific aspect of retaining and attracting new members.

**Leadership** – I will be working with many members throughout the District to develop leadership tools. I am thinking of videos, train the trainer ses-





On weekdays, residential parking permit is required to park on Meredith Dr. You may park in the Christ Lutheran Church parking lot (entrance directly across the street from the Norway House).



From Beltway or I-66: From the Beltway, go West on I-66. Exit I-66 onto Rt. 123 (Chain Bridge Rd.) south toward Fairfax (Exit 60). Go about a half mile. Turn right on Rt. 50 west (also Rt. 29, Lee Highway, and Fairfax Blvd.). Just after the 3rd traffic light, turn right on Meredith Dr. (between a Merchants Tire store and a Mobil gas station). Norway House is on the right.

From Rt. 50/29: Go west from the Beltway about 5.33 miles. After crossing Rt. 123 (Chain Bridge Rd.), stay in the right lane. Just after the 3rd traffic light, turn right on Meredith Dr. (which is between a Merchants Tire store and a Mobil gas station). Norway House is on the right.

From far western suburbs: From I-66 East, take Exit 52, Rt. 50, east, toward city of Fairfax. Go about one mile. Turn left at Fairfax Blvd., which is where Rt. 29 joins Rt. 50 (which itself angles left). Turn left after a Mobil station onto Meredith Dr. Norway House is on the right.

Metro & bus: From the Dunn Loring/Merrifield Metro station (on the Orange Line), go to Bus Bay E. Take bus 1C toward West Ox Rd. and Alliance Dr. The bus will go down Lee Highway/Fairfax Blvd. (Rt. 50/29). Get off about 30 min. later at Meredith Drive (after Warwick Ave.).
